

# CHAS. G. ANDERSON, PROMINENT MERCHANT PASSES AWAY TUESDAY

Funeral Services Are  
Held Here This

Charles G. Anderson, a prominent Wheatland business man for the past 20 years, passed away at his home Monday night shortly before midnight. Mr. Anderson had been ill for about a week and while his condition was considered serious his untimely end came as a distinct shock to his family and large circle of friends.

Funeral services were held at the Congregational church this afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. R. E. Morgan, pastor of that church, performed the final rites. Burial was made in the Wheatland cemetery with the Lyla Watson Funeral home in charge of arrangements. Masonic services were rendered at the cemetery.

Pall bearers were O. O. Natwick, Osgood Johnson, George Milne, T. R. Shepard, R. A. Ferguson and C. E. Artist.

Mr. Anderson was born at Halmstad, Sweden, January 5, 1864 and came to this country when he was 7 years of age, when with his parents he settled in Pennsylvania. In 1882 they moved to Valentine, Nebr., and the deceased worked for a time in a general merchandise store. Later he engaged in the contracting business in Valentine and on the Rosebud Reservation.

In June 1894 he was married to Miss Effie Bristol and in 1912 the family moved to Wheatland. He became a partner of J. H. Yeast in the hardware business here and was a member of that firm until his death.

Mr. Anderson is the first one of a family of eight children to answer the call of his Maker. The other seven children: Mrs. Emma Burgland, Miss Jennie Anderson, August Anderson, all of Bradford, Pa., Mrs. Mary Johnson of Detroit, Mich., John Anderson of Rosebud, Mont.; Mrs. Maggie Carlson of Valentine, Nebr., and Claude Anderson of Redlands, Calif., all survive their brother.

He was a member of the Wheatland Masonic lodge A. F. & A. M., and was a member of the local Congregational church.

In his immediate family he is survived by his widow and four children; Melvin, Gertrude; Mrs. Leone Butler and Mrs. Arlo Goodrich, all of Wheatland. Four infant children preceeded their father in death.

The business houses of Wheatland were closed this afternoon from two o'clock until 3, to show their respect to our departed friend and business associate.
