

CALL, WILLIAM ALBERT  
April 26, 1872-June 26, 1932

William A. Call, 60 years old, departed this life at his home three miles west of Dwyer, Sunday morning, after an illness of one week. He had suffered a stroke of paralysis, complicated with high blood pressure, but he had rallied and his death came as a great shock to his family and many friends, who anxiously watched for some improvement in his condition.

Mr. Call was one of the early settlers of this community, and had seen a great deal of experience in the sixty years of his life. He had always been known as a hospitable and kind neighbor and friend. Six years ago he confessed his faith in Jesus and accepted Him as his personal savior and was baptized by P.O. Gates, who organized the Church of Christ at Dwyer.

Besides his devoted wife, Mrs. Kate Call, he leaves two sons, Leonard and Earl, both of Dwyer, his grandchildren, a sister, living in Texas, and a host of friends, who will miss him sadly.

The third son of Mr. and Mrs. Call, Ora, volunteered among the first of the Platte county boys when this country entered the World War, and lost his life on the battle field of France. The Wheatland American Legion Post was named in honor of Ora Call.

The funeral was held at the local Christian church Wednesday afternoon with Marion C. Morris, former minister of the Dwyer church, but now of Prickett, Colo., and an old friend of the Call family, delivering the funeral address, being assisted in the services by Cecil V. Smith, pastor of the local church. Pall bearers are G.R. Ballard, Luke Fergley, Claude Adams, J.A. Lindsey, R.E. Duffy, and Clarence Snakenberg. Burial was made in the Wheatland cemetery with the Lyla Watson Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.
