

CARMICHAEL, GEORGE H.
February 2, 1879-October 25, 1942

George H. Carmichael was hit by a car driven by John Montez, 22, Friday night at the intersection near the Logan Shell service station and was taken to the hospital where he passed away at the hospital a few minutes later at nine o'clock. Following an investigation by Sheriff Sutherland and Acting Coroner P.A. Shope, it was decided the accident was unavoidable and Montez was exonerated of all blame.

George Carmichael for years has been a figure around town, known to all and pitied for the feeble condition in which he was, suffering from an injury to his back when kicked by a horse and later by a slight stroke of paralysis which made it difficult for him to get around.

George was born February 2, 1879 at Wilbur, Nebraska, and for 52 years has resided in this community. He is survived by five sisters and two brothers: Mrs. Geo. Phillips of Oakland, Calif., Mrs. Jessie Lamberson of Turlock, Calif., Mrs. Frank Agnew, Los Angeles, and Mrs. Frank Ranson of Sumner, Washington. Bert Carmichael was here from Cheyenne to attend the funeral, but the other brother, Dewey, has not been heard from for some time and his whereabouts are unknown.

Funeral services were held Monday, December 28, from the Watson & Dennis chapel with Rev. W.W. Maxwell of the Methodist church officiating. Burial was made in the family plot at the Wheatland cemetery.
