Funeral services for the Rev. Sidney A. Hoadley III, 77, were held Friday, ⁵⁻⁸⁻¹⁹⁹⁵ May 12, 1995 at All Saints Episcopal Church in Wheatland, with the Rev. Richard Kalber officiating. Interment followed in the Wheatland Cemetery. The Rev. Hoadley died at Platte County Memorial Hospital in Wheatland on Monday, May 8, 1995. Memorial gifts to the donor's choice would be appreciated by the family.

He was born May 3, 1918 at Castana, Iowa, the son of Sidney A. and Rebecca (Shay) Hoadley II. He moved with his family at an early age to Wyoming, and attended schools in Torrington, Lingle and Guernsey. He then attended a boarding school in Laramie, moving to Lincoln, Neb., where he graduated from University High School.

After his graduation from the University of Nebraska, he attended the Episcopal Theological Seminary in Cambridge, Mass. He served his internship in Central City, Neb., and in 1943, he went to Green River, Wyo.

He and Mary Ellen Maxam were married in St. Matthew's Cathedral in Laramie, on Aug. 17, 1944. He was a priest in Evanston, Wheatland, Clay Center, Kans., and Canyon City, Colo. He left the ministry for a time and worked in banking and construction in Denver, Colo. He returned to Wyoming to the ministry in 1969 and served in Laramie, Rock River, Medicine Bow, Hanna and then Wheatland, where he retired in 1983.

He is survived by his wife, Mary Ellen of Wheatland, daughter and son-in-law Rebecca and Terral Young of Winnemucca, Nev., and a son, Sidney A. Hoadley IV of Laramie. Also left are two sisters, Betty Jane Leupold and Patrice Huddleston, both of Lincoln, Neb., and three grandchildren. He was preceded in death by his parents, and one brother. The casket was closed for the service.
