

HOLLAND, MINNIE ULA DOTTS  
February 21, 1883-April 7, 1907

Mrs. Wm. J. Holland passed away at her home in this city, on Sunday night, April 7<sup>th</sup>, 1907, after a lingering illness of several years duration, death being caused by tuberculosis.

Mrs. Minnie Ula Holland was born February 21<sup>st</sup>, 1883, near Rehoboth, Indiana, and was married to Wm. J. Holland, March 18<sup>th</sup>, 1900, at Afton, Indian Territory. Two years later, in company with her husband, she moved to Colorado on account of failing health, removing to this place February 5<sup>th</sup>, 1904.

The deceased was held in highest esteem by all acquaintances. To know her was to love and respect her on account of her kindly disposition and her many womanly graces. Together with her husband, she united with the Baptist church at Afton, Indian Territory, and was always a faithful worker for God and the church. She was a valued member of the Ladies Aid of the M.E. church at Wheatland. Although she suffered untold agonies from the dread disease that carried her away, and often expressed the desire that she might regain her health, she bore her suffering with greatest fortitude and sought to calm anxieties of loved ones with the thought of a better and happier home, where pain and death are no more.

Besides a sorrowing husband, the deceased is survived by a sister, Mrs. J.P. Douthitt, of this place, and her father, P.M. Dotts, of Clipper, Washington. Her mother and a sister precede her to the great beyond.

Funeral services were conducted at the M.E. church Tuesday afternoon at 2:30, conducted by Rev. J.E. Butler who made many remarks of the beautiful character of the deceased, and songs which had been selected by the departed, were rendered by the choir, as was one also at the cemetery. "God be with you until we meet again"
