## Marian Wormwood Rugg Hudson

*September 24, 1914 – January 3, 2006*

Graveside services and interment for Marian Wormwood Rugg Hudson, 91, will be conducted at 1 p.m. on Saturday, Jan. 14 in the Wheatland Cemetery at Wheatland.

She died Jan. 3, 2006, in Los Angeles, Calif.

Marian was born Sept. 24, 1914, in Glendo, the daughter of Florence (Christian) and Charles Wormwood. She graduated from Glendo High School and the University of Wyoming at Laramie. While working in Laramie for the University, she met her future husband, Kenneth Charles "Casey" Rugg, a basketball player for the University of Wyoming. Casey was the son of a well-known Wheatland family, Art and Winnie Rugg. After Marian taught school for several years at Kemmerer, she and Casey were married June 4, 1940. During World War II, they lived in Texas and California as Casey was a Lt. Commander in the U.S. Navy. After the war, they owned and operated a dry cleaning business in Laramie for a year; then moved to Berkley, Calif., where Casey worked on his master's degree. To finish his degree and complete

his PhD, they moved to Bloomington, Ind. in 1947. While Casey was associated with Indiana University, Marian taught home economics in the Bloomington public schools. She taught for 36 years in the middle schools. During this time, she earned her master's degree in education at Indiana University. She was very involved in several professional organizations.

Survivors include a daughter, Sally and husband, Mack Brown of Roseburg, Ore.; two sons, Arthur Charles "Acey" Rugg of Byron, Mich. and Donald Rugg of Los Angeles, Calif.; four grandsons, Steve Brown and his wife, Lynn and Barry Brown all of San Francisco, Calif., and Brad Rugg and Brian Rugg of Lizton, Ind.; and two great-grandchildren. Other surviving Wyoming relatives live in Saratoga, Cody and Lusk.

She was preceded in death by her parents; husband, Casey Rugg, on Oct. 8, 1959; a sister, Francis Hansen; and a brother, Oliver Wormwood.
