

## **Sandy Kendig dies in fall at her home**

The Record-Times learned at mid-day Tuesday that Sandy Kendig, a well-known Wheatland woman, died as the result of a fall in her home shortly before the newspaper went to press.

Few details were available at press-time, but sources indicated Mrs. Kendig slipped in the bathtub and struck her head. She was taken to Platte County Memorial Hospital where she was pronounced dead.

Mrs. Kendig was the wife of Ed Kendig, a member of a long-time Wheatland banking family, and at the time of her death was serving as a member of the board of directors at First State Bank.

Long active in civic affairs, Mrs. Kendig recently served as the narrator for the Christmas Cantata at United Methodist Church on Dec. 19.

A service for Christian burial for Sandra Outsen Kendig, 50 will be held Friday, Dec. 31, 1993, at 10 a.m. at the Wheatland United Methodist Church, with the Rev. Karin E. Wade of All Saints' Episcopal Church officiating, and assisted by the Rev. Dr. James S. Vuocolo of the United Church of Christ, Pastor Mark Patzke of the Covenant Lutheran Church and Rev. Linda Barnes of the Wheatland United Methodist Church.

Interment will follow in the Wheatland Cemetery.

Mrs. Kendig died Tuesday, Dec. 28, 1993 at her home in Wheatland.

She was born March 21, 1943, in Denton, Tex., the daughter of Robert and Berniece (Redshaw) Outsen. She attended school in Wurzburg, Germany, and Tokyo, Japan, where her father served in the military. The family returned to the United States in 1958, and Sandy graduated from Laramie High School in 1961.

Upon graduation from the Pasadena Playhouse College of Theatre Arts in 1963, Sandy became a member of the production staff at Stage Society Theatre in Los Angeles, where she later was general manager for eight years.



## **Bank director dies of natural causes**

WHEATLAND — Sandra Kendig, a 50-year-old Wheatland business woman, died Tuesday at her home of natural causes an autopsy revealed, a Wheatland Police Department spokesman said.

Kendig, who was a director of the First State Bank in Wheatland
