

C. H. McCULLOUGH PIONEER RANCHER PASSES AT HOME

Chas. H. McCullough, one of the pioneer ranchmen on the Cottonwood passed away Saturday after an illness of some time.

Funeral services were held Tuesday from the Congregational church with Rev. L. W. Flenner performing the final rites. Interment took place in the Wheatland cemetery with the Lyla Watson Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Charles Hartley McCullough was born at Bangor, N. Y., Feb. 12, 1855. He was united in marriage to Harriet Adelia Cushman at Bangor, December 19, 1877. To this union five children were born, Bernice Ragan of Guernsey, Floyd and Arthur of Dwyer, Maude Baker of Oak Creek, Colo., and Edna Frances who passed away in infancy. There are ten grand children and two great grand children. His loving and faithful wife also survives him.

Mr. McCullough's boyhood was passed at the place of his birth and at the age of 24 he left the Empire state and moved to Central City, Okla., where he engaged in the feed business. He continued at that place for three years and then came to Wyoming. He was employed for some time on the Cross T ranch at Uva and then took a homestead on the Cottonwood, which he developed into a fine home and ranch.—Wheatland Times.
