### MRS. D.M. MORRIS EXPIRES SUDDENLY

The community was shocked Wednesday evening when news reached town that Mrs. D.M. Morris had passed away a few hours before after an illness of about a day, death being caused by a stroke of paralysis. Mrs. Morris was first stricken Tuesday night and Wednesday, her condition being unimproved, it was thought best to bring her to Wheatland where she could be near to medical aid, but she became worse on the way to town and was taken to the home of J.J. Strait, southwest of town, where she passed away during the evening.

Mrs. Morris is survived by a husband and two children, and a sister, Mrs. Andrew Neilson, of this place. She was formerly Miss Daisy M. Curtis, and taught school in the section for a number of years. She was united in marriage to Mr. Morris about ten years ago. She was one of the most highly respected ladies of this section and news of her untimely demise will be received with much pain by all acquaintances.

### MORRIS

Daisy M. Curtis was born at Parkersburg, Iowa, in September, 1874, and died on Wednesday evening of last week. She taught school a number of years in this section, and was united in marriage to D.M. Morris in August, 1897. A short account of Mrs. Morris' sudden illness and death was contained in these columns last week. Besides the husband and two children, a boy and a girl, aged 7 and 4 years respectively, the deceased is survived by two sisters, Mrs. A. Neilson of this place, and Mrs. William Henry Hawkes, of Tie Siding, and two brothers, Frank and Fred Curtis, who live near Douglas. Mrs. W.H. Wells, of Diamond, is also a step-sister of the deceased.

Funeral services were conducted at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Neilson in this city on Friday afternoon, being conducted by Rev. E.L. Butler of the M.E. church, and interment was made in the Wheatland cemetery. The services were largely attended by the friends and old-time acquaintances of the deceased, many being present from a radius of twenty miles. The pall bearers were: Messrs. E.M. Banks, F.N. Shiek, E.P. Hill, Thos. Hunton, John McDougall and S.A. Moore.

All the relatives of the deceased were present at the funeral except the two brothers near Douglas, who could not be reached by wire. Mrs. H.C. Tonges, of Lead, South Dakota, a sister of Mr. Morris, arrived on Friday evening's passenger, too late to attend the funeral.

The bereaved husband and children have the heartfelt sympathy of everyone in their affliction.
