Kathryn Marie Mylet was born in St. Libory, Neb., on June 15, 1904, the youngest daughter of Henry and Emma Kuiper. She passed away in Taos, N.M., on May 11, 1988.

Mylet is survived by sons Tim of Taos and Dan of Alcatraz, N.M., granddaughters Monnie of Worland, Samantha of Albuquerque, N.M. and Mary Margaret of Taos, and grandson Damion of Venice, Calif., great-grandchildren Yasha and Molly Hartberg, brother Clarence of Denver, five nieces, four nephews and several great nieces and nephews.

Kathryn was pre-deceased by her parents, her husband John T., her eldest son Larry, grandsons Hugh, Colin and Tom, four brothers, two sisters and one nephew.
