

ROBINSON, JAMES DUDLEY
September 20, 1908-December 31, 1947

James Dudley Robinson, 39, of Rock River, a veteran of the second world war, was found dead last Friday in a cabin at the Arlington resort, where he had been employed. Funeral services were conducted at the Stryker mortuary Monday morning at Laramie and burial was here with the VFW in charge.

Arlington is on the northern edge of the Medicine Bow forest, near McFadden, some 60 miles northwest of Laramie.

Dr. E.B. Sturges, Carbon county coroner, Rawlins, said that the cause of death was still under investigation. On a table near the body was a suicide note in Robinson's handwriting, the coroner said. Also nearby was a vial, containing capsules, which are being analyzed, he continued.

The body was found by James P. Norie, 612 South Second, Laramie, a fellow workman with Robinson, at a new resort being constructed at Arlington for Frank Bosler. Norie had taken a letter from Robinson to his wife in Rock River the previous day and returned to the camp to find him dead. Dr. Sturges said the man had been morose and depressed.

Robinson was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Robinson of 563 North Fifth, Laramie. His wife and two children, Audrey, 12, and Steve, 10, reside at Rock River. He also had two sisters, Mrs. Sadie Gore of Laramie and Mrs. Robert Fortune of McFadden. He was born July 15, 1908 (?) at Owen, in the northeastern part of the county. He had lived all his life, except during his service in the second world war, in Albany county.

Robinson served in Hawaii and New Guinea in the army infantry. He was a technical corporal when he was discharged about two years ago.

He was a mechanic and had been installing gas appliances at the resort during the last month.
