Hubert Scott Victim of Typhoid Fever

At eight o'clock Wed. evening Hubert Scott aged 24 died of typhoid fever, after an illness of several days. He is the son of the late T.A. Scott and Mrs. Scott living on a farm south of town about five miles. He was unmarried. His mother Mrs. T.A. Scott, brothers, and sisters survive him. The family has lived in this section for several years. The father died a year ago last March.

The remains are at the Lingwith-Richards Funeral Home. Funeral arrangements have not yet been made.

Hubert Scott, son of Mrs. T.A. Scott, who lives southeast of Wheatland, passed away Wednesday night after a three weeks' illness of typhoid fever. The deceased was working at a road camp near Cody at the time he contracted the fever.

Funeral arrangements have not been made according to the Longwith-Richards Funeral Home, who have charge of the body.

Hubert Scott was born in Missouri, and was 25 years of age at the time of his death. He came to the Wheatland section about 15 years ago with his parents and has resided here most of the time since. He is survived by his mother, three sisters, Mrs. Roy Hamm, Mrs. Vernon Maddox and Thursey Scott; three brothers, Robert, Edward and Albert, all of Wheatland. His father passed away about a year ago.

Funeral services for Hubert Scott, who passed away last Wednesday from the effects of typhoid fever, were held Friday afternoon at 2:30 from the Methodist church. Rev. D.M. Kitch, pastor of that church, performed the final rites.

Burial was made in the Wheatland cemetery with the Longwith-Richards Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

The deceased was 25 years of age at the time of his death and had resided in the Wheatland community for about 15 years.
