

SMITH, JAMES E.  
March 21, 1880-March, 1933

James E. Smith, one of the real pioneers of this section of Wyoming, passed away in Cheyenne after a short illness, Saturday morning, at the age of 53 years.

The deceased came to this section of Wyoming about 30 years ago. In the early days he worked near the Jones ranch southwest of Wheatland. Since that time, he's made his home in Wyoming, living a part of that time in Casper. For the past 5 years, he's been ranch foreman Dougal Whittaker outfit at Horse Creek, south of Wheatland.

Mr. Smith was born in Lincoln County, Nebraska, March 21, 1880. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Anna Smith and one daughter, Mrs. Ted Chambers, of Midwest. A daughter, Mrs. Whyde Webb, preceded her father in death in 1931.

Funeral services were held from the Congregation church Sunday afternoon at 2:30. Rev. R.E. Morgan of that church preached the final tribute and interment was made in the Wheatland cemetery with the Lyla Watson Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Following a major operation performed in Cheyenne, James E. Smith died Friday, March, 24<sup>th</sup>. He was a former resident of this section, leaving here to locate in Casper and for the past five years has been foreman on the John Whittaker ranch on Horse Creek. He leaves to mourn his passing his widow, a daughter, Mrs. Edna Chambers of Midwest, three sisters, Mrs. Dave Miller of Wendover, Mrs. Gertrude Howell of Laramie, Mrs. Pearl Moorehouse of Bucoda, Washington, two brothers, Charles of Guernsey and Bert of Cheyenne, and many other relatives. The remains were brought to Wheatland, where services were conducted by Reverend R.E. Morgan in the Congregational church Sunday afternoon at 2:30, and burial was made in the Wheatland cemetery with Lyla Watson Funeral Home in charge.
