

SUNTYCH, ALOIS ANTON
1887-April 27, 1942

Stricken with a heart attack Monday morning, A.A. Suntych was rushed to the Wheatland hospital where death claimed him shortly before noon.

Mr. Suntych had suffered from heart trouble for some time but recently been feeling considerably improved and word of his death came as a sudden shock to his many friends.

Funeral services were held on Thursday afternoon at the First Methodist church for A.A. Suntych who died Monday forenoon at the Wheatland hospital following a heart attack earlier in the morning at his country home northwest of Wheatland.

Mr. Suntych was born September 11, 1887 at Farwell, Nebraska, moving later to St. Paul and still later to Ord, where on April 7, 1913 he was married to Agnes Beran. Twenty-three years ago they came to Wyoming and settled on a farm he bought.

Besides his wife and one son, John, 19, he leaves one brother, Victor Suntych of Dannebrog, Nebraska and two sisters, Barbara Rojewski of Hastings, Neb., and Minnie Hessler of Herington, Kansas. Two sisters of Mrs. Suntych, Mrs. S.G. Allen of Stanton and Mrs. Frank Pader of Norfolk, Nebraska also arrived for the funeral.

Mr. Suntych was among the country's true noblemen. Liked and respected by all. He was a very successful farmer and stockman, and despite his heart trouble, was a hard worker which proved his undoing. He had a hobby, that of being a sportsman in it's fullest sense. He followed "the call of the wild" in each season and enjoyed the outdoor life with his sport companions.

And with the passing of this good man rests upon the shoulders of his wife and young son to "carry-on" as was his desire, and to them goes out the sympathy of all in their hour of sadness.
