

WOODS, NATHAN WILSON
December 8, 1828-September 6, 1901

Nathan Wilson Woods, whose death was briefly chronicled last week, was born December 8, 1828, in Carlisle, Cumberland county, Penn., and died at the home of his son on the Laramie river, Friday, September 6, 1901. A wife and four children survive him, the children being Samuel Woods of Uva, Mrs. G.C. Smith of Hot Springs, S.D., C.W. Woods of Cheyenne, and James B. Woods of Butte, Mont.

Funeral services were held at this place Saturday, conducted by the Masonic fraternity, and were largely attended by old-time friends and acquaintances. All the children of the deceased were present at the obsequies, with the exception of the son living in Montana.

Mr. Woods came to Wyoming a quarter of a century ago, when Laramie county was chiefly known for its Indian raids and kindred incidents of the then far western frontier. He took a prominent part in the early history of the country, and was twice chosen as county road supervisor. He will be kindly remembered by many friends among the old time residents of the county.
